Instruction & Assessment Librarian Andy Yeager is co-chairing the steering committee, which oversees all of the working groups. Technical Services Librarian & Archivist Jean Linn is co-chairing the standard IV working group, support of the student experience, with Clerk Jenny Crandall also serving on this group. 

A grant for the instruments was secured through Art Services, Inc. This space is unique as this is the only public library in Erie County to have an outdoor music garden.

Librarian Ashley Cassidy was recently promoted to Librarian II at the **Hamburg Public Library** (*Buffalo & Erie County Public Library*). She oversees both the Hamburg and Lake Shore libraries and supervises all staff. Congratulations to Ashley for all she does in making the Hamburg Public Library the success it is!

Librarian Laura Dumuhosky was recently hired at **Richmond Memorial Library** (Nioga Library System). Laura was an academic librarian for 15 years and expresses deep excitement for an opportunity to work in a public library. Her first library job out of graduate school was a part-time reference and instruction position with Genesee Community College, at which time she worked simultaneously at the Genesee Country Village & Museum. From there, the trajectory into academic libraries was an easy one, though working as a substitute librarian for Richmond during part of this time was a highlight. While at SUNY Brockport, she switched to an instructional designer position, helping instructors to create, maintain, and improve online and hybrid courses. During this time, she spent a great deal of time working toward getting online and hybrid courses fully accessible for students with disabilities, and training instructors on how to use Microsoft products to create accessible materials, as well as remediating PDFs. Working in academia for so long, Laura says she was often pulled away from direct contact with the patrons who needed her most. She is looking forward to supporting and providing needed services to people within her community. Working hours on the Adult Reference Desk and collecting the library's media (DVDs, Blu-rays, audiobooks, CDs and the library's upcoming vinyl collection) should be a good fit for her, as a selfproclaimed mediaphile.
